Course Information

Course Description

This class is an introduction to the literature of medieval Europe and the methods of studying earlier literature. We will look at linguistic developments, historical backgrounds, textual history and cultural context. Chaucer will be read in the original Middle English. Not to worry! Middle English can be mastered with just a modest effort at learning some new grammatical features.

Course Description and Requisites

Study of selected writings in medieval English literature and their continental sources. With prior permission of graduate advisor may be repeatable once for credit.

Prerequisite: Classified standing or instructor consent.

Note: This course satisfies graduate-level GWAR in this master's program.
