Course Catalog Description

Development of advanced communication skills, both written and oral. Emphasis on writing formats used by criminal justice professionals. A scholarly paper, written in APA format and informed by research, will be required. GE Area: Z Prerequisite: A3 or equivalent second semester composition course (with a grade of C- or better); Completion of core GE, satisfaction of Writing Skills Test and upper division standing. Allowed Declared Major: Justice Studies. Note: Must be passed with C or better to satisfy the CSU Graduation Writing Assessment requirement (GWAR).

Instructor’s Course Description

This is an integrated writing course designed to develop advanced communication skills, which are valuable for a career in the criminal justice profession. Effective written communication skills are vital to success in any career, and are particularly important to the criminal justice professional. The best method for improving these skills is through extensive practice, critical feedback, revision, and understanding the fundamental principles of writing.

Prerequisites

A grade of “C” or better in English 1B, a passing score on the Writing Skills Test (WST),

upper division standing, and completion of the Core GE.

Course Requirements

Success in this course is based on the expectation that students will spend, for each unit of credit, a minimum of forty- five hours over the length of the course (normally 3 hours per unit per week with 1 of the hours used for lecture) for instruction or preparation/studying or course related activities including but not limited to internships, labs, clinical practica. Other course structures will have equivalent workload expectations as described in the syllabus.

SJSU Writing Requirement: To satisfy the University’s Written Communication II requirement, students will be required to write a minimum of 8,000 words with an overall grade of “C” or better. Assignments in JS100W include: *expository responses to justice related topics, a critique of scholarly literature, an annotated bibliography and the development of a research paper*. All of these assignments provide practice in critical reading, thinking, and writing strategies necessary to plan and execute purposeful writing. Purposeful writing includes analyzing research, generating ideas, developing a thesis, organizing and writing a first draft, revising for form and content, editing for grammar, punctuation and spelling and evaluating, using, and documenting supporting materials.

Justice Studies Reading and Writing Philosophy: The Department of Justice Studies is committed to scholarly excellence. Therefore, the Department promotes academic, critical, and creative engagement with language (i.e., reading and writing) throughout its curriculum. A sustained and intensive exploration of language prepares students to think critically and to act meaningfully in interrelated areas of their lives—personal, professional, economic, social, political, ethical, and cultural. Graduates of the Department of Justice Studies leave San José State University prepared to enter a range of careers and for advanced study in a variety of fields; they are prepared to more effectively identify and ameliorate injustice in their personal, professional and civic lives. Indeed, the impact of literacy is evident not only within the span of a specific course, semester, or academic program but also over the span of a lifetime.

Writing Evaluation: Evaluation of written work is as follows:

- **Content (20%):** The overall content of the paper including details and reference information.
- **Style (20%):** The way the student composed the paper, specifically in terms of perspective.
- **Organization/Citations (20%):** The order by which the student presented information in the paper and paragraph structure.

- **Grammar/Sentence Structure (20%):** The grammatical elements of the paper and sentence structure.
- **Observations/Conclusions (20%):** The general and specific observations and conclusions drawn from the paper.

Each evaluated item shall consist of 100 points and weighted as follows:

Material for Evaluation

Assignments include the following:

Article Reviews: Students will be required to read and write a review of an academic article from a scholarly journal. The instructor will assign the article. The article review must be no longer than 1,000 words, double-spaced with a 12-point font, and conform to APA style (not including cover page and bibliography). (CLO's 1-3)

Literature Review: Students will be required to write a literature review on a topic related to the student's research paper. The literature review must be no longer than 1,000 words, double-spaced with a 12-point font, and conform to APA style (not including cover page and bibliography). (CLO's 1-4)

Discussions/Social Media/Class Participation: Students may post to outside blogs or websites and receive additional credit for class participation. The instructor will provide a list of approved websites and/or blogs. Students must obtain instructor permission prior to

posting to an outside website.

In-Class Assignments/Class-Participation: Student will be required to complete/participate in-class assignments. These assignments will test the student's ability to review specific literature or events relating to a specific topic or event within a limited time. The student will be required to read, analyze and prepare a short review of a specific literature or event relating to a specific topic. Instructor will administer the in-class assignments throughout the semester. Students will not receive notice of the in-class assignments; therefore, it is important that students attend class regularly.

This grade will be based on the in-class assignments, instructor's judgment of students' contributions to group discussions and class.

(CLO's 1-6)

In-class assignments may include any of the following:

- 1) Critical Thinking
- 2) Perspective Rewrite
- 3) Grammar/Sentence Structure Rewrite
- 4) Mini-Article Review
- 5) Speech Writing
- 6) Life Outline
- 7) In-class Essay

Peer Evaluation and Revision: Following some of the in-class assignments, student will have the opportunity to have their work evaluated and reviewed by partners or group members. Once reviewed, students may rewrite the assignment for additional points.

(CLO 2)

Annotated Bibliography: Students will draft an annotated bibliography for sources used in their research paper. The annotated bibliography must include at least five (5) sources and annotations. Students should summarize, assess and reflect upon each source cited. The annotated bibliography must be no longer than 1,000 words, single-spaced with a 12-point font, and conform to APA style (not including cover page and bibliography).

Book Review: Students will be required to read and write a book review. The book review must be no longer than 1,000 words, double-spaced with a 12-point font, and conform to APA style. *(CLO's 1-4)*

Research Paper: Students are required to write a research paper that is due at the end of the term. This paper will cover a topic within the field of Justice Studies and will be persuasive in nature. Each student will choose a topic from a list provided. The *discussion*

section of the research paper must be no longer than 1,500 words (not including the cover page, abstract, introduction, literature review and bibliography), double-spaced with a 12-point font, and conform to APA style. **The instructor will not accept late papers.** (CLO's 1-4)

Rewrites & Revisions: This class requires students to keep pace with the course material and complete the assignments by the scheduled due-date. Notwithstanding, students may revise and resubmit certain assignments for up to half the difference between the total amount of points possible for the assignment and the student's original score. The instructor has the sole discretion to award additional points and to determine which assignments are eligible for rewrites. Rewrites and revisions are subject to the following conditions:

- The original assignment is complete and timely (Does not include *Book Review*, *Annotated Bibliography* or *Research Paper*).
- All previous assignments are complete and timely.
- The student, and the student alone, made the actual and material improvements to the assignment (this does not include assistance the student may have received from the Writing Center).
- The student has not already twice submitted the assignment.
- The revision will substantially improve the student's grade on the assignment. (CLO's 1-4)
