Museum Funding Programs

Fiscal Year 2020

Eligibility for Museum Grants

- Eligible: museums located in the United States, its territories and freely associated states. Colleges and universities, and nonprofit organizations eligible for some programs also.
- Not eligible: federally funded institutions, for-profit organizations, individuals, and foreign countries and organizations.

Other Requirements for Museums

In addition to meeting governance and geographic requirements, to qualify as a "museum," an organization must also:

- use a professional staff;
- be organized on a permanent basis for essentially educational or aesthetic purposes;
- own or use tangible objects, either animate or inanimate;
- care for these objects; AND
- exhibit these objects to the general public on a regular basis through facilities that it owns or operates.

The program supports projects focused on:

- training and professional development of library and archives professionals;
- Developing faculty and library leaders
- Recruiting, educating, and retaining the next generation of library and archives professionals

- Current significance

LB21: We are interested in proposals that will recruit, train, develop, and retain a diverse workforce of library and archives professionals, and have a significant impact on the capacity of library and archives professionals to contribute to the well-being of communities.



National Digital Infrastructures and Initiatives

NLG: We are interested in proposals that will have a significant national impact on the capacity of libraries and archives to provide access to diverse digital content, collections, and services to a wide range of users.

LB21: We are interested in proposals that will recruit, train, develop, and retain a diverse workforce of library and archives professionals, and have a significant impact on the capacity of library and archives professionals to provide access to diverse digital content, collections, and services to a wide range of users.


- Visit www.imls.gov.

- Check your registrations: DUNS, SAM.gov, and Grants.gov.
- Talk with a Program Officer.

Application Tips

- Be certain your project goals relate to the goals of the program and category to which you are applying
- Be succinct—avoid jargon and acronyms
- Develop a realistic schedule of completion (project timeline)
- Identify consultants and other key personnel or outline the selection process
- Keep in mind the communities you serve and why this work is important.



Application Tips

- Include an evaluation component to show how you will recognize and measure success.
- Prepare a budget that matches the activities described in your narrative.
- Write your budget justification that explains how you calculated each figure.
- Have an unfamiliar reader offer feedback.
- Proofread!
